

**International Association of Lions
District 14-B
Reorganization and 1st Cabinet Meeting
August 13, 2005
Center for Hearing and Deaf
Pittsburgh, PA**

The meeting was called to order at 9:02 AM by DG Jim Brubaker. After one verse of America and the Pledge of Allegiance the Invocation was given by Lion Tom Hurrell. DG Jim Brubaker then established protocol and welcomed everyone to the first Cabinet meeting of the new Lion year.

DG Jim noted that there were 75 Pennsylvania Lions at the International Convention in Hong Kong. The weather there was hot and humid. The Hong Kong Lions were wonderful hosts and very helpful. Next year the International Convention is going to be in New Orleans July 10-18.

In lieu of roll call District Cabinet Secretary Lion Greg took attendance as the Cabinet members presented their reports.

DG Jim reported that International Director Lion Sam Milliken was present at the recent State Council meeting in Valley Forge, PA; his remarks included some major items from the International Convention. One was that the LCI audit committee is now a standing committee and will have professional assistance to do the audits. They also passed a ruling that sub districts and districts must approve a candidate for a higher office. DGs and VDGs must now be voted on at your state convention (14-B already does this). The lifetime membership fee was increased to \$500 from \$300. Clubs now have 6 months to retrieve a lost charter.

International Director Sam also mentioned that LCI has given a major grant to Solace in South America for a process to purify drinking water. He explained that when the LCIF is considering a grant they consider the need to be met, the sub district's contribution, the community contribution and the percentage of the project requested from LCIF. PID Bob Miller also spoke at council about "Passion to Excel" and the new Mission 30 and model club programs intended to help the MERL team with membership. PID Bob is the National Director of Mission 30. He also reminds that our speaker request forms and the recognition and reward forms are due by the 30th of December. PID Bob Miller is also the National Coordinator for Sight First II; IPDG Dennis, our Regional Coordinator will discuss that later.

PIP Joe Wroblewski requested that we endorse Albert Rendell for second Vice President. Past International Director Rendell and his wife were present at the council meeting with his wife. PID Rendell is a retired police detective from Long Island and Mrs. Rendell is a retired Air Force doctor.

The All State band would like more representation from Western PA. They especially need of trombone, French horn and low bass instruments. They will have 80 in the band in Altoona and 120 in New Orleans. The cost of the trip is \$1,000 to \$1,300 per student. They will be gone for 10 days. PA All State Band monies will pay 60-70 % of that amount leaving \$498 to be paid by each student. They suggest each student request their local Lions Club to help with this expense.

International President Dr. Ashok Meta's theme is the "Passion to Excel"; it is focused on five key areas: a Passion to Grow, a Passion to Serve, a Passion to Lead, a Passion to Promote and a Passion to Perform.

My Goals for the District are based on these. His Passion for Growth program is called "Plus One". He proposes that each club gain one new member and each District gain one new club. The Tarentum club increased their membership from 13 members to 22 members with one membership night last spring so it can done. We need more Lions to serve, it is as simple as that.

There are 26,511 members in PA; about 800 were lost this year. We have 3557 women members in PA. If each club gained one women member it will overcome our entire loss for the year. PA lost 15 clubs and gained 4. In IPDG Dennis' year, 14-B bucked the trend by adding the new Duquesne Club, two Leo clubs and a branch club in Bridgeville.

Under Passion to Serve each club should implement or revitalize a program to better serve the community. Something visual or something the community knows you are doing. Under Passion to Lead two members per club attend at least one meeting outside their club during the year. This can be zone meetings, Cabinet meetings, State events or training sessions. Under Passion to Promote your club should put an article in the local paper describing a local Lions service project you are proud of. Also provide the Cauldron with articles on club events. Send it to Lion Editor Jim Hartman by the 25th of the month and he will get it in. Under Passion to Perform each club should send at least one club officer to a Lions training seminar. I receive reports by mail, phone and computer; we need to standardize. Each club should develop the capability and submit its monthly reports to LCI by computer by next Spring. I have asked Lion Tim Orsega to be a consultant for club secretaries who are struggling or having problems with their reports. I hope all you PDG's will be mentors because there is a lot of training to be done.

PDG Rich Keller received a three-year appointment to the State Officers Seminars Committee.

Voting members of the Cabinet are DG, VDG, IPDG, District Secretary, District Treasurer, 8 Zone Chairs and the 4 Region Advisors. To all the voting members of the cabinet it is important for you to attend all four cabinet meetings. If you miss more than one I think you are not fulfilling your obligations to the cabinet.

Parliamentarian PDG Jack Schimmel states the rules for the cabinet meeting. According to Lions International Constitution and Bylaws, all procedures are under the District Constitution and Bylaws, nothing can super cede the Internationals Constitution and Bylaws and if there is any question on any of these then Roberts Rules prevail. Those are the rules for the meeting. There are 15 voting members on the cabinet and you need 8 members for a majority. There is not enough in attendance to pass anything. Only voting members can make motions and seconds on anything. Discussion held.

PDG Jack Schimmel confirms that the voting members this year are DG, VDG, IPDG, District Secretary, District Treasurer, 8 Zone Chairs and 4 Region Advisors. We are going to ask that this rule be waived, for this first meeting only. The voting members here in attendance shall vote on any district business that comes before the group today. Motion made by Lion Michele Matuch and second by Lion John Aiken to waive the rule. Motion passed

A list of all district members was reviewed to identify those that could meet these requirements. A meeting is scheduled for August 16, 2005 at 6:30 to review the 67 that were identified.

Also Long-Range Planning looked at the revisions to the Blind Contingency policy and procedure. A committee was formed to rewrite this policy. A copy for the revisions is in this report. The District Governor also has the revised changes to be voted upon by the cabinet.

Lions Clubs International Foundation LCIF

Lions Clubs International is the grant-making arm of Lions Clubs International. LCIF is Lions helping Lions serve others. It's the only Lion's Foundation that serves the entire world and all 1.4 million Lions. Working with Lions, LCIF prevents blindness. It provides food and clothing to victims of natural disasters. It also gives youth the tools to succeed through Lions-Quest, empowers the disabled through vocational training. And promotes health by equipping clinics and hospitals.

LCIF is an efficient charity. Administrative costs were 10.8 percent 2003-2004, a low ratio for a non-profit. Every dollar donated to LCIF goes to a grant. LCIF receives no club dues. Since it began in 1968 LCIF has awarded US\$356.9 million in grants.

LCIF has mobilized nearly US \$12 million for tsunami victims in South Asia. The funds will enable Lions to build homes, school and orphanages in Sri Lanka, Indonesia, Thailand, and India. Lions also provide psychological treatment and physical rehabilitation for children and adults.

July 17, 2005 featured a packed house at PA Lions Appreciation Day. Our best guesstimate from 14-B is 11 Lions and 2 guests. As always in spite of humid conditions, it was a great day for fun, fellowship and a time to enjoy the fruit of our contributions. By the way, no one from 14-B won the Great Duck Race.

While at Beacon Lodge I have the privilege of chatting with a few blind campers who were staying at the 14-B dorm. They were thankful about the new carpeting (they can feel the difference as they walk upon it in their bare or stocking feet) and in particular, they expressed their appreciation for the new bathrooms. They did have one request. “Would you please put an exhaust fan in the bathroom? With all of us having at least 1BM a day, the air quality becomes very undesirable? They were assured their concern would be addressed.

On the front burner for September (mark you calendar) is our work weekend schedule September 16, 17, and 18 (Friday evening into sometime Sunday). This is critical if we are to bring out Dorm up to speed in time for next year camping season. Our game plan is 2 fold. (#1) Weather permitting, power wash and then paint the outside of the Dorm. (#2) Remove existing ceiling tile and lighting in 3 of the 4 apartments and install new ceiling tile as well as new lighting. Work not completed will default to the spring work weekend, this is a tall order, but for the exception of wiring new lighting. It does not require special skills or heavy labor. Obviously we need help and lots of it. Age and gender matters not. What does matter is your sincere desire to be of service while you are there. Fun and laughter will have but this not a day at the beach.

Camp will provide sleeping accommodations within the Lodge. However, we will need to provide our own bed linens as well as splitting the cost of meals whatever that amount might be. IPDG Dennis McCarthy (although he doesn't know it yet) will feature some great breakfast, lunch and dinner.

Tools required are the same ones you would use if performing the same functions at home. If you are painting bring your paint tray, roller, brushes, masking tape, drop cloth, rags, etc. If you intend of installing ceiling tile consider a straight edge, utility knife, pencil, drop cloth and a short step ladder or step stool etc.

On the 14th of July I received a phone call from PDG Dennis McCarthy asking me to call a Mr. Fry who was seeking help in obtaining an eye-prosthesis. Upon contacting him I learned that he had already had the procedure completed. I called Dr. Tillman's office and the secretary said she would take care of the situation with no involvement of the district.

In my last report I told of a Ms. Spearman requesting an eye prosthesis for her son. Upon investigation I learned that he had received prosthesis under the agreement we have with Dr. Tillman's and they would not supply another one as they had insurance. Mrs. Spearman called and said the Insurance Company only paid a part of the bill and that she had received a bill for the balance from Dr. Tillman. I called the Dr's office and they got to insurance company to pay the full amount. She also informed me that her son needed eye-glasses. I told her that I was not involved in the eye-glass program and to contact the DG and he would advise her on what to do.

If anyone in the district other than myself is contacted for a prosthesis please refer them to me and I will deal with Dr. Tillman. I won't go into detail but someone in the district meddled in Mr. Fry case and caused unnecessary work for the DG, Dr. Tillman's secretary and myself.

As of this date we still have two prosthesis left for this year.

Blind and Vision Rehabilitation Services of Pittsburgh Chair Lion Meghan Nelson (written report)

In June the Board of Directors voted to rename Pittsburgh Vision Services to Blind and Vision Rehabilitation Services of Pittsburgh. The vote was unanimous and the new name went in to affect 6/18/05. During the first week in June dust was flying and wires were being walked across as all the employees from the Oakland and Bridgeville moved into their new offices. Remodeling is officially finished and everyone has moved but PBA industries (textiles and the Broom Shop). Plans are to have them move next year.

HDS has been running a Hearing Healthcare Campaign entitled "Listen to the Rainbow" using TV and radio, outreach presentations, BAYER sign on Mt. Washington and soon on inside/outside of PAT buses. I am still collecting all makes and models of used hearing aids as part of the Hearing Recycling Program. Parliamentarian PDG Jack Schimmel

First comments to zone chairmen and region advisors, Region Advisors are in essence are region chair persons. I call your attention to the policy manual and your zone chair books. Zone chairs are required by International policy to make two club visits to their clubs annually to tell them what is happening in the state. All this information comes to the zone chairs through the DG. The region advisors according to policy are required to make one visit to each club in their region.

Technically you are required to conduct three meetings in your zone annually. That's all in the book. It is all mandated by Lions International you are expected to attend all 4 Cabinet meetings because you are that voting member of the cabinet and you decide the business of the District. Try your best to be there. I would like to make a recommendation that if you do not have a chair for a particular agency then contact the agency for a representative to attend the cabinet meetings or their funds maybe forgotten. All the cabinet members should be submitting articles to the newsletter.

Within three to four years the International and the state will become paperless. The state is in the process and the International is looking into it.

We have two appointments for the PA Lions Hearing Research Foundation board. It is imperative that 14-B fill those seats.

DG Jim mentioned we endorse PID Rendell from New York.

The Lions of PA Foundation has developed another Fellowship. It costs \$500 to become a Joseph Wroblewski Fellow and you must be a Pennsylvania Fellow first.

Lions Hearing Meeting at the Eye and Ear Institute is in October. The meeting is held in the Western part of the state every three years. There will be representatives from other Districts there. We need representation from our District.

The State Convention is in Altoona next May. The Ramada Inn is the convention headquarters.

USA/Canada Forum in Peoria Illinois; 120 are attending from PA. 2300 attendees signed up and about 2800 are expected to attend. With three intense days of seminars and forums, the forum is a better place to learn about Lionism than the International Convention.

There is an appointment at the State for the State Investment Committee. They meet twice a year to review and study the states investments. An understanding of investments is required. If you are interested see the Governor.

There is a Leadership Development meeting in Carlisle August 20-21. People who should be attending are the VDG and MERLOW team. I am going to recommend to the DG that we have a school for Zone and Regional chairs.

Old Business

State Council requests Districts to vote on adopting an Alcohol and Drug Awareness contest. Letter read by DG Jim. They want to know if we would favor this as a state project.

IPDG Dennis reminds us that last year our District voted down participating in the Alcohol and Drug Awareness poster contest as did 16 of the 18 District Governors. It is being brought back because of a variation in policy and procedures that the person didn't present it correctly. Discussion held.

PDG Jack Schimmel, comments what Long Range Planning is hoping to do is to get this thing out there similar to the Peace Poster and hope that everyone will participate. The concept of this is good. Lions International has focused their Drug and Alcohol in the Quest Program. In the State of PA there is \$100,000 to train teachers to put the Quest program in the schools. What they are hoping to accomplish with the Drug and Alcohol contest is to create a new interest in the Drug and Alcohol program in PA. Long Range Planning is not asking that 14-B participate in the program but to approve this as a state project to be sent to state constitution and by-laws committee for review and to write the rules.

Discussion. Motion on whether to accept the Drug and Alcohol program as state project by Lion John Aiken, 2nd by Lion Alex Parrish. Motion defeated.

MTI Photo Screeners

At the last cabinet meeting Long Range Planning was asked to look at disposition of the MTI photo screeners. LRP requests the cabinet for a vote to sell the camera to Dr. Corbin of the Tarentum Lions Club. She is interested in purchasing both cameras and will suggest a price after she examines them to make sure they are retrofitted.

Discussion held. Lion Jim Emery comments that other clubs should also be allowed to bid.

Motion by Lion Alex Parrish to let Dr. Corbin evaluate and make a bid.

2nd by Lion Greg Borichevsky. Motion passed.

Audit not ready will be voting on audit in November meeting. We are waiting for Lion Mic's final report.

Discussion on the Blind Contingency Fund was put on hold until November meeting.

Policy 109 will be going back to Long Range Planning.

New Business

District phone report IPDG Dennis McCarthy (written report)

I have met with the District Governor concerning the district phone. Since July 1, 2005 we have received 27 phone calls. One was a request for an eye prosthesis that was referred to PDG Bob Johnson. Seven asked where they can drop off used eyeglasses. Two wanted to be speakers, one about organ recovery; the other about AARP services. Three needed eyeglasses and one wanted to donate money to the District. Most calls are from people in need of eye glasses. Last year 16 people needed our assistance in getting glasses. We average at least one such call a month. Some called about where to drop off glasses and ask if we ever advertise where glasses can be dropped. They know the Lions collect them but are not sure where to take them. Zone chairs, please remind your clubs that if we call your club on a referral to provide glasses, please get back to us. Discussion held. Also discussed the Lions Gift of Sight Program.

IPDG Dennis Letter read the following letter.

I want to first commend you on your excellent work while volunteering with the people of Nicaragua. Sorry for the delay in responding back to you but we have had full agendas at our meetings and did not have time to discuss your request. If you are planning another mission next year you may want to ask the District Governor to speak at one of his cabinet meetings. Again, Congratulations on your successful venture. I wish that we were able to financially support you but currently we are unable to assist.
